Ridicule, taunting, name-calling, denial and betrayal are things that speak to our own experience only too well. Likewise, violence, pain, doubt, desolation, loneliness and death are part and parcel of what it means to be human.

In all of these things, Jesus experienced and shared our human lot and this month ends with Jesus dead and in a tomb and all the ramifications of that for his friends and family.

That of course is not the end of the story, but we have to wait for the 1st day of the following month to rejoice in and experience that!

Never let us forget that he came to be like us, so that in the end, we may become like him.

Seeking a replacement for Katherine

Whilst Rev. Katherine Pickering is still very much with us and making her mark in so many ways, she decided that she should move on in August 2018. The Circuit therefore entered the Stationing process, hoping to be matched with a Presbyter to replace Katherine from next September.

Our Circuit Invitations Committee prepared a "profile" of the circuit and the forthcoming vacancy. Along with 145 other appointment profiles, this was circulated to ministers intending to move, and we received 85 profiles of available ministers.

The Committee prepared a shortlist of ministers, and each minister a shortlist of circuits.

The Connexional Stationing panel met early last November, and matched us with Rev. Jocelyn Bennett, currently working in the Hyde & Denton circuit. A visit was arranged, and Jocelyn and her husband Neil visited Milton, Great Western Park, Wallingford and Didcot on Saturday 18th November. After they set out back to Manchester later that day, the committee discussed the match and unanimously agreed that we would invite her. Over the phone the following evening, she was pleased to accept. So next August, Jocelyn and Neil, and their teenage son Elliott, will move into the manse in Lydalls Close, to start work in our Circuit at the beginning of September.

Meanwhile, Katherine and Ian visited the South-west Worcester circuit, and she in turn was invited to fill their post, and she accepted; so she will take up her new appointment in charge of two churches in Worcester at the same time.

Grateful thanks are due to all those who gave their time and effort in the three churches to make Jocelyn's visit a success.

Circuit Website - <u>www.wantab.org.uk</u>

The first aim of the site is that people accessing the site from outside the circuit should find it welcoming and can easily navigate it and find out about our Circuit and its churches. This was demonstrated as achieved during the stationing process, as we know that presbyters including Jocelyn Bennett looked at the site in early October (see a later article for more about Jocelyn.)

Each church has an entry on the "Churches" page, which link to an "online poster" with basic facts and picture(s), together with minister's contact details and information about the coming month's services; this page can be expanded to a "site within a site", as has been done for Grove. There is a calendar, with colour-coded entries for upcoming Circuit and Church events, and news articles supplied from around the Circuit.

The second aim is that people within the Circuit can use it to find or disseminate information – as a replacement for the online Circuit Directory, and a central repository for downloadable documents. Linked to this is a tool to assist in preparing the preaching plan, which will be put to the test in April.

ThenMedia are continually developing the tools used to build the site (the colourcoded calendar was added at our request and is still being refined) and the site menu was recently modified to accommodate a page about the Youth Music and Drama Group.

Update on Community Chaplains at Great Western Park

Sarah and Libby have now been based at Great Western Park for over 9 months and they have now passed their probationary period with flying colours. The time seems to have flown!

They have made and are developing lots of connections in the area. Whilst continuing to wander the parks and alleys of Great Western Park, they are both very much welcomed by many people who live and work in the area.

They regularly go into one of the local secondary schools to have lunch with students, give the occasional assembly at Stephen Freeman School, and support the work of the Rainbows, Brownies, Guides, and various Mums & Tots groups.

They regularly meet with the manager of The Station Pub; salespeople at McCarthy & Stone - the local retirement home; the manager of the corner shop; and Chair to the Residents Association.

They bring concerns to Residents' Association meetings, share in the fellowship at the Thursday morning Community Cafe, and are valued members of the wider community.

In December, they trialled a different use for the chaplaincy motorhome, Hope, by turning her into a mobile prayer space. Many of the groups with whom they have contacts offered to host some time out in the busyness of the run-up to Christmas: Northern Community Centre on 30th November, Asda on 13th December, Boundary Park on 19th December and Costa on 27th December.

Following the successful "Chaplaincy Everywhere" training course in the Circuit, several people have expressed an interest in volunteering as Chaplains. This is great news, and the team are now considering how best to progress this extension to the project.

May they be assured of the prayers and encouragement of everyone in our churches as they seek to serve God in new and exciting ways. Please pray also for Katherine as she pioneers the extra role of line-managing the chaplains, and for the support group who help the team in so many ways.

Safeguarding – further training sessions and new procedures

Most people requiring the Refresher Course for Creating Safer Space have now been trained and should have received a certificate. More sessions will be arranged as needed. The full Creating Safer Space training, which is required by new postholders, is being arranged soon, and may be led by a trainer supplied by the District. If you are aware that you or other post-holders in your church need this training, please contact Keith Underhill who will be making the arrangements.

The safeguarding policies drawn up by the Connexion for circuits and churches will be held online and updated at intervals. The current versions can be printed for approval annually at the Circuit Meeting, and individual Church Councils – normally in the autumn.

Milton Charity

One of the Milton congregation, Emma Mtendera, comes from Zimbabwe. Emma told the Church of the desperate plight of people as the social fabric - schools, medical services etcetera - has collapsed. Emma's sister Alice, who is aged nearly 80 and who trained as a teacher, runs a charity to feed and support blind women and their children, called 'Ray of Vision', in Harare. This presented a good opportunity for the church to get directly involved in a small charity, part of our extended church family.

At the beginning of November they held a coffee morning to support Alice's work. It made a very happy morning's fellowship, and £450 was raised. Shortly afterwards, Emma went to Didcot and wired the money directly to her sister.

Alice supplied a selection of pictures, telling the story of how they spent the money. The Milton folk were very pleased to see the large party bags of food at the bottom of the tree and the presents each child received, and look forward to their next fundraising effort for this charity.

Yotam Theu

Mark Sandels, of Grove Methodist Church, met Yotam Theu in 1988 when he visited his sister, who taught Yotam under her VSO placement in Malawi. Yotam registered "Christian Church" in Mzuzu, northern Malawi, with the Malawian Government, and Grove has sponsored Yotam and his work since 1998. There has been longstanding prayer and financial support, which has seen Christian Church grow to many congregations as Yotam's evangelistic programme has progressed.

This support has helped Christian Church to build new church buildings and paid for a truck for Church use in 2014. However, the truck was already 20 years old when he bought it and has had nearly 4 years of heavy use and is in need of replacement.

In a second new development of Yotam's work this year, he and the leaders of Christian Church have decided to build a campus in Mzuzu, the capital of the Northern District where Yotam lives. The campus will provide a focus for training leaders and evangelists.

Fundraising for the new truck has already started. The aim is to send £15,000 or so in Summer 2019. Building work on the Campus is well underway, but additional funding will be needed to roof the buildings, and to resource the training programme based on the campus.

Yotam has recently sent his own report on the progress towards the Campus. This can be found on the Circuit website, or contact Mark Sandels, Circuit Mission Secretary, for a copy.

Inspiring youth weekend at 3Generate

A circuit group of 10 young people and three leaders, Rev Katherine Pickering, Ian Pickering and Graham Ifill, had a fantastic time at 3Generate, the national Methodist

weekend for children and young people, held in November 2017 at Pontins in Southport.

We joined up with the group from Witney High St Methodist Church and travelled together by train from Didcot. The journey was quite an adventure and it took 4 trains and a short coach ride to get us there. But it was worth it! The weekend was fun, inspiring and challenging and also very cold! It must have been the coldest weekend of the year in Southport with icy winds, hail and rain and yet everyone had a thoroughly good time! There were over 1000 children and young adults aged 8-23 and more than 600 leaders taking part.

There were many options to choose from and one of our group said he wished he could stay for a week to have time to do everything! The children participated in: worship, gospel singing, "tricky" bikes, swimming, computer games, a silent disco(!), messy science, faith challenges, voting for the new Methodist youth president and learning in various workshops how to be "agents of change" by engaging with some of the social and global issues of our world.

Late on Saturday evening our group met together for a time of "chalet worship" sharing thoughts, prayers and reflective comments about the weekend. Each group was given a "worship bag" containing a selection of craft materials and a challenge to choose a favourite Bible story (the children could have covered the whole Bible!) and then use the paper, clay, sticks and pipe cleaners to show a scene from the story. In less than an hour, interspersed with hot drinks, snacks and prayers, the group had completed a wonderful model of Moses and the burning bush, illuminated by some finger torches, acquired at the urban praise session earlier in the evening.

We concluded with prayers, sitting by the torchlight around the glowing burning bush, knowing we were in the presence of Jesus the light of the world who wants us all to be his light in our world.

New worship format launched

A new worship format, suggested at Worship Consultation, was launched successfully at Grove.

The format:

A feature film is screened in the Meeting Room from 4pm. After the film, light refreshments are served, followed by a short act of worship in the Church which will be based on themes and issues from the film.

A collection is taken as usual during the service — there is no charge for the film. The premiere:

The first "Film Plus" service was held on 4 January, led by Rev. Keith Underhill. The film on this occasion was "Of Gods and Men", which portrays the life of a community of French monks who share in the life of a village the mountains of rural Algeria, as terrorists move into the area and they must decide whether to return to France or stay.

Around 20 people attended the service and the consensus was that the worship drew out our responses to the film, providing some challenging questions and opening avenues into prayer which are newly relevant today, although the film is based on events over 20 years ago.

The sequel:

On 11 February; the film "Amazing Grace," telling the story of the idealist William Wilberforce as he works to end the British transatlantic slave trade, was shown. Andrew Lockley linked the film with the theme of Racial Justice Sunday. The trilogy:

One more service is currently planned, on March 18th at 4 pm. The film is not yet finalised, but Rev. Keith Underhill will lead. All are welcome to attend. After this, the outcome will be reviewed and further services may be arranged.

The Christina Noble Children's Foundation

I have spent some time living and working in Mongolia with The Christina Noble Children's Foundation and this cold snap has kept me thinking of conditions out there.

Winters in Mongolia can reach -40c and many families have little shelter, living in the traditional Mongolia Ger (yurt) or fragile wooden huts, with little to protect them from the freezing weather.

The Christina Noble Children's Foundation has been working in Mongolia since 1997, supporting children and families living in the most desperate poverty.

Through a contact in this country, we are able to send boxes of much needed warm clothing so if anyone is able to provide knitted cardigans or jumpers, hats, scarves (calling all knitters!), new packets of underwear and good quality thick children's coats/boots/shoes we are able to get them to Mongolia where they will be put to good use.

In addition, if anyone has old cameras, binoculars or laptops we can sell these and raise money to fund the sending of these parcels to Mongolia.

6. You should not borrow other people's problems. They can better care for them than you can.

7. You should not try to relive yesterday for good or ill, it is forever gone. Concentrate on what is happening in your life and be happy now!

8. You should be a good listener, for only when you listen do you hear ideas different from your own. It is hard to learn something new when you are talking, and some people do know more than you do.

9. You should not become "bogged down" by frustration, for 90% of it is rooted in self-pity and will only interfere with positive action.

10. You should count your blessings, never overlooking the small ones, for a lot of small blessings add up to a big one.

A **prayer** by a former Bishop in South Sudan, consisting of 28 words which he encourages people to repeat twice a day as a way of making a prayerful intention towards peace.

Love, joy, peace, patience, compassion, sympathy, kindness, truthfulness, gentleness, self-control, humility, poverty, forgiveness, mercy, friendship, trust, unity, purity, faith, hope – I love you, I miss you, I thank you, I am wrong, I am sorry, I forgive, we forget, we are together. My brothers and sisters, peace be with you.
