To heal and strengthen, serve and teach, and love the Word they've known. Here the outcast and the stranger bear the image of God's face,

Let us bring an end to fear and danger:

All are welcome, all are welcome, all are welcome in this place."

## **Church Stewards**

Since the last Annual Church Meeting we have been looking at ways of celebrating the 175 years of Methodism in Wantage to offer a vision of what we are about. We asked Movers and Shakers to pick this up and Margaret Fordham, Ann Barber and Eileen Rennie were asked to look at the detail of this. Many ideas have been suggested and a programme for 2020 has been put together from these ideas. They were discussed and agreed with Keith and the wider church. Thank you to all those who have been involved with events so far, and we look forward to continuing these special occasions throughout this year.

In the past few years we have been encouraged to read all the Bible in a year and a group have completed the "Disciple" Course, exploring how the Bible, and church tradition interact with history to mould our understanding of Discipleship in the present day. In October 2019 we offered our church family the opportunity to come and find out about **Holy Habits**. Andrew Roberts from Bible Reading Fellowship came to speak to us for the day, and give us some ideas about how our church could develop these Holy Habits. There were good discussions (and a good lunch), and those present were very enthusiastic to go forward to explore Holy Habits further. However, it was felt that this year we are very committed to celebrating our Anniversary, so a proposal to launch Holy Habits at the beginning of 2021 was put forward and Church Council has agreed this. In the meanwhile the stewards felt a small planning group should be formed to begin to think about which order we might do each habit, and ideas of how we might achieve them. Please let Keith or any of the stewards know if you would like to find out more about this.

**In January 2020** June and Kelvin opened the chapel and offered a quiet space for Holocaust Memorial day. This was much appreciated by those who came and we thank them for the time they gave to preparing and hosting this event.

We have been pleased to host other events for the Circuit and District this year. Most recently was the Advanced Safeguarding training day for the District. Many very nice comments were made about our premises, so our huge thanks go to all who keep everything in such good order.

Over the last few years, a working party appointed by the Methodist Conference was asked to prepare a report studying **Marriage and Relationships**. This report was presented to Conference last summer and they received it and sent it out for consultation by the local congregations. The District Synods this Spring will debate the report and then vote on whether to accept or reject it. This will inform the Conference representatives on the views of the local membership before the debate this year in Conference at the end of June.

The report is a careful review of the whole subject and well worth studying. It is not a light read! Copies are available free from Keith or the Stewards. Keith has led four open sessions to discuss this and share views in smaller groups. These have given us an opportunity to learn more about the issues and understand the challenges we face in the modern world. The stewards would like to thank Keith, for the time he has spent preparing for these, and all who came and shared these sessions.

**Keith works hard** and continuously for us and the Circuit, and we are grateful for all the energy and enthusiasm he brings with him. In order for him to recharge his batteries he will be going on Sabbatical in September, not that he is going to put his feet up because he and Liz will be spending six weeks walking the Camino! (The path of pilgrimage across northern Spain to Santiago de Compostela)

While he is away, the stewards' team, church and Circuit, will be supported by Helen Cameron. We will look forward to meeting her in due course.

It has been a blessing to have Sue Haithwaite with us on the stewards' team, and I hope Sue has enjoyed her first year with us as much as we have enjoyed working with her. The stewards' team would ideally be made up of six church members but we have been unable to fill that gap so instead have what we call 'Sunday Stewards'. At present we have three, Diana Gawlas, Jan Abrahall and Peter Preston who act as second steward on certain Sundays. We are very grateful to them, especially as two of the main stewards are also projectionists and you can't be everywhere at once.

A quick mention of the **church rota**, another steward's nightmare, but made much better by all you kind people who step forward to help each week with a smile, and put up with my many and varied mistakes! Thank you all, stewards and Keith for making Wantage Methodist Church such a warm and welcoming place.

## Pastoral

During the summer of 2019, for the first time in several years, our membership fell just below 100, but this total soon rose again. At a morning service in September, three of our young people were confirmed into membership: Charlotte Worth, Audrey Akowuah and Maureen Akowuah. At the same time, eight adults became members by transfer from their previous churches: Peter Bainbridge, Joan Kidd, Edwina Loftus, Alex Mwangi, Celia Roser, Mary Spalding, Margaret Watts and Margaret Wilson. We are delighted to welcome them all.

We were sad to record the death of one of our elderly members, Pam Scholes, on 17<sup>th</sup> October. Pam had been unable to worship with us since the decline in her health necessitated her admission to Framland Care Home, but until then she had been a faithful member at both Wantage and Grove over many years.

On 26<sup>th</sup> October Lincoln, the baby son of Dave Johnson and of Lizy Horton who had grown up within our church, was baptised. We were pleased to welcome their families and friends to the service that morning, which turned out to be an occasion for a double celebration! Keith had become sixty the day before and we held a party for the whole church family. It was a very happy event for everyone, even if it was huge surprise for Keith, since the plans had been a well-kept secret. This was a chance for Keith, who is usually the one giving pastoral care to members of our church family, to be on the receiving end instead. It was good to have the opportunity of celebrating not only his milestone birthday, but also of thanking him for all that he has brought to our church in the last three years, and hopefully for many more to come.

With sadness we recorded the death of Terry Adams on 20<sup>th</sup> December in the nursing wing of St Katharine's. Terry had been a member of our church for many years, as

well as a local preacher within our Circuit, although he had not taken any services in the recent past. We give thanks for Terry's participation in the life of our church whilst he was in good health.

As the year has continued, the number of residents moving into the Renaissance Fleur de Lis apartments and choosing to worship us with has continued to rise. The proximity to our church makes it a short and easy walk for them, and they are also becoming involved with weekday church activities too. It is very encouraging to be told that we are a welcoming church, and good to know that our efforts at outreach are bearing fruit as we observe the increasing number of people participating in Sunday services and weekday groups.

A scarcity of Pastoral Visitors has long been a cause for concern in our efforts to provide pastoral support to all of our church family. Ideally everyone who worships with us would be allocated their own Pastoral Visitor. In reality we cannot achieve that without the lists for each one becoming unreasonably long. We ensure that everyone who has not committed to membership is personally given a newsletter each month, and therefore has a contact person within the team. It was a great joy at the annual commissioning service in January to include Jane Kent and Cath Worth who have kindly agreed to be joint Pastoral Visitors for our young members, Charlotte, Audrey and Maureen, as well as for Jordan and Zack. This is a pleasingly age- and activityappropriate pairing through Jane and Cath's regular contact with them all through YMoses.

As a team we remain grateful, as always, to Keith, whose pastoral ministry is such a highly valued and deeply appreciated blessing for our whole church family.

#### **Communion Stewards**

John Leake wishes to stand down when we have found a replacement and Eileen Rennie has indicated she will retire by March 2021. Mary Trotter very ably performs the duty of keeping the communion cloths in pristine condition. She too has agreed to continue in this service for a further year. Our thanks go once again to Mary.

Thank you to my entire fellow Communion Stewards and other helpers for their support in ensuring that all the Communion duties are fulfilled efficiently.

## Worship Consultation

Worship Consultation meets each quarter to look at all aspects of worship at Wantage Methodist Church and also to plan and review any special services. This is an open meeting and all are welcome to come and express their ideas and suggestions about worship. The notes from these meetings are available from Carolyn Roche.

Most meetings begin with a discussion led by Keith looking at different aspects of worship. During the past year we have talked about Testimony and how sharing the positive experiences and struggles of our journeys of faith can be an encouragement to others. In September there was a discussion about the role of Music Group and also the use of copyright. We next reflected about how we worship beyond the church building and what this means to us. At the last meeting we discussed the use of the lectionary in our services and we also looked at the use of themed services. Once again the February meeting was on Shrove Tuesday and we greatly enjoyed the pancakes prepared and cooked by Keith.

The regular pattern of services has continued throughout the year. At Harvest we began our third project through our partnership with All We Can. Matthew Forsyth continues to inspire us when he comes to lead worship and to update us on the groups we have helped.

We thank Keith for providing the Advent and Lent liturgies, helping us to prepare for Christmas and Easter. The Scratch Nativity service with the blessing of the angels was much appreciated by both kids@church and the 10:30 congregation. Christmas continued with the Carol Service, Christmas Eve Communion and AAW on Christmas Day. The first Sunday of 2020 was Covenant Sunday, always a special service plus the recommissioning of the Pastoral Visitors. Lent began with the Circuit Ash Wednesday service being held at Wantage. There was a full programme of activities during Lent including the Sunday Lent liturgy, Bible Study groups and films to make you think.

We have welcomed a variety of people to lead the Worship Through .... services held on the first Sunday of the month, except when this has coincided with a special service such as Easter Day. The themes covered in the past year include History, Music, Poetry, Colossians, Taizé, Jigsaws, Memories, Stories, Books and 3Generate. If requested, a small planning group will usually meet with the person who is leading one of these services.

It was the turn of Wantage to hold the annual memorial service in November. This year time was changed to 6 pm. The service was well attended.

Bible Month in 2019 took place in July when the services and Bible study groups looked at the book of Colossians. In 2020 it will take place in June and the Book of Ruth has been chosen – a favourite of many people. Eileen's House Group continues to meet on Tuesday afternoons and Alison leads a group during Advent and Lent.

The Disciple course finished in July and the group felt they had really benefited from the in-depth study of the Bible. Many thanks to Keith for organising and leading this.

As 2020 is our 175<sup>th</sup> anniversary we are welcoming past ministers or people connected with Wantage Methodist Church to lead worship on the last Sunday of the month. So far we have welcomed back Rev Andrew Hollins and Rev Janet Evans.

As a church we have agreed to use the Holy Habits course, beginning in January 2021. This will involve planning and preparation during 2020.

#### **Music in Church**

We chose not to have a choir for carol service this year, but rather to conserve our time and energy to be channelled into starting rehearsals for "Firebrand" in the New Year. Although "Firebrand" is about much more than just music, I would like to say, here in my music report, how impressed I have been by the dedication and enthusiasm with which a group of some 27 singers, aged from 6 to 80-something, have tackled learning to sing in parts – something which is completely new to some people. Thank you all for your support. Experienced singers and novices alike, you are making a great sound.

## **Junior Church**

Junior Church runs every Sunday except the third Sunday of the month when we have Kids@church. We have a lovely group of primary & younger secondary school aged children who attend Junior Church regularly plus a variety of other children who join us from time to time. Sometimes children of crèche age join us for a story or craft activity. We have continued to use the Roots resources, supplemented by ideas of our own. The group enjoy a variety of activities including looking at Bible stories through craft, painting, cooking. The under-11s also attend kids@church. It is a real pleasure to spend time with the children.

Junior Church continues to be led by Alison Phillips, Heather Wells and Cath Worth with Carolyn Roche taking the group if the other leaders are not available. In order to meet safeguarding rules there always need to be two adults with the Junior Church and crèche children once we go out of the service. The second steward is available as an extra adult but offers of help are always welcome.

## Movers and Shakers for Mission and Service

Movers and Shakers meets three times a year and the meetings are open to all of the church who wish to attend. The group exists to promote most of the activities that occur outside of Sunday worship. These can vary widely and range from regular weekday meetings, one-off events designed to raise money for charities and church projects, as well as facilitating meetings to enhance our Christian life. Representatives from the regular meetings and activities e.g. Wednesday Fellowship, Church Lunches etc. are invited to provide updates to the group but make their own reports to the Annual Church Meeting.

Here are some of the ways that we have been engaging in mission during the past year.

- We are now in our third year of partnership with the charity 'All We Can', the Methodist Relief and Development Fund. During 2018/19 we raised funds for 'Rays of Hope', a project to buy solar panels for irrigation. Thanks to all who helped with this and particularly Eileen and her team for the splendid afternoon tea and Liz and Keith for 'A Taste of Summer 2'. Thank you also to the Smith family who co-ordinate our work with All We Can. Our third project is called 'Deepen Your Roots' helping a group in Ethiopia grow potatoes so that they can have an income.
- Community Café began in 2019 and has proved to be a great success. It is open every Monday throughout the year. Thanks to the team that makes this such a warm and welcoming time and space.
- Knit & Chat has continued to meet on the first and third Mondays of each month. Their main focus is on knitting the Christmas angels with 1300 being provided for Christmas 2019. They also knitted green squares for the wonderful wooden Christmas tree made by Arnold Tucker. The squares are now being made up into blankets.
- The Christmas Tree Festival took place again on Dickensian evening and was a great success with many people visiting over the weekend. Once again the Caritas Children's Choir was greatly enjoyed. Refreshments, a coffee morning and donations helped to raise over £600 for Wantage and Grove Street Pastors. We also support the Street Pastors through individual Prayer Support Volunteers and now have a Street Pastor in training.
- Continuing our work to be a Dementia Friendly church, Keith has met with both Rose Butterworth and Kate Czecko and they have visited the Community Café. It is at their suggestion that we now have exit signs on the outer toilet doors.
- Once again we signed Christmas cards for the inmates of Bullingdon Prison. There was also the opportunity to sign greetings cards as part of the Amnesty International Write for Rights Campaign.
- The collecting tins in the toilets have enabled us to fund our thirteenth toilet for the Toilet Twinning project.

- The church was open for prayer and quiet reflection on Holocaust Memorial Day. Thank you to June and Kelvin for the displays and for organising this.
- We helped 13 young people from the Circuit go to 3Generate an inspiring weekend for young Methodists.
- There was the annual envelope and box collection for World Mission.
- We continue in our support of a variety of charities, many of them local, including Foodbank, Little People etc.
- The church is an active supporter of Christian Aid. In Christian Aid week we provide collectors and this year the evening service will be at Wantage Methodist Church.
- In November we began our journey with Holy Habits when Andrew Roberts came to talk about his book and how we might use this in the future. It has been agreed that this is our project on 2021 and beyond.
- In March we hosted 'Breaking the Taboo' led by Rev Stephen Normanton of Peer Talk. This is part of the Circuit initiative on mental health.

We are very grateful to the small planning team who have devised the list of events that will keep us busy and give us lots of enjoyment during 2020. So far we have had the Burns Supper and music quiz and there is so much more to come.

## **Community Drop In Café**

This idea was brought to a Movers and Shakers meeting in February 2019 and it was agreed we should give this a go and see how it was received. We set up on 29<sup>th</sup> April and were pleasantly surprised at the number who dropped in. The numbers attending each week range between 35 and 45, but we have topped 50 on a few occasions. We have regulars who come most weeks, some staying for the entire morning and most weeks we welcome new people. There is the option to just sit and chat or to do jigsaw puzzles, or play games or colouring. We also have a table of books you can browse and choose something to take home to read.

We have 22 enthusiastic volunteers who sign up regularly for duties. We have two in the kitchen serving tea/coffee and two in the hall welcoming people as they arrive. The rotas for April, May and June are on the notice board outside the Parlour so please feel free to sign up.

There is no charge for tea/coffee, cake etc., but there is a donations basket. Since we opened we have been supporting the charity Fund for Human Need and to date we have reached around £1600.

At the Movers and Shakers meeting in February it was agreed that we would support four causes in our second year. These are:

- Clean Slate, a low cost, long term listening and support service for all victims of abuse and mental illness
- Hope UK, Equipping young people in your community to make drug-free choices
- Through the Roof, Transforming lives through Jesus with disabled people
- Our Church Hall Refurbishment Fund

We look forward to another successful year when new friendships and support will be established.

We will still be sending any profit from the Friday lunch to a charity suggested by one of our team. Any profit from the Sunday lunch goes into church funds, which helps with the upkeep of the building and also provides tea and coffee facilities etc.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the kitchen and waiting-on staff for their continued support and help. Without a team of volunteers this would not be possible. And a big thank you to all who support the lunches. It is a pleasure to see everyone and the fellowship which takes place at the dinner table.

## **Tuesday House Group**

Our lively and friendly group meets on Tuesday afternoons during term time at 50, Warmans Close from 1:30 pm to 3:15 pm.

We have once more had a very successful year. Currently we have 17 people in the group. Our average attendance each week is 13. The group is now in its nineteenth year of meeting. Everyone in the group appreciates the fellowship, sharing and caring they find for and from each other, which has grown over the years. We are always happy to welcome anyone to this study group whether on an occasional or permanent basis.

Each meeting includes prayer, bible reading and discussion. In prayer time we have used the Methodist Prayer Handbook "Responding to the Gospel" and the District Prayer Diary together with our prayers of concern and thanksgiving for people and situations in our own churches, our families, friends and beyond. Our meeting on the first Tuesday of each month includes the monthly prayer list from the newsletter. We start each meeting spending a little time for prayer requests in bringing our concerns to be noted for inclusion in the prayer session at the end of our meeting.

In the period April 2019 to March 2020 we have covered a variety of topics. In April we completed our Lent Study "Daring to know God now" and visited St. Mary's Convent during Holy Week for prayer and reflection at the Stations of the Cross. This was followed by eight sessions on Christian Character which then brought us to our study of Colossians for Bible Month. In July we had a day for quiet reflection at St Mary's Convent, when we spent in-depth time on our study of Colossians. We met the first week in August for the monthly prayer meeting, afternoon tea and to discuss topics for study for the next twelve months beginning with our return on 3rd September. On our return we completed the last four sessions on Christian Character and followed this with a study of Acts 13 - 28. Our Advent study this year was the York Course, "Who are we praying to?". On our return in the New Year we took time to share our highlights of Advent and Christmas, then a week sharing our favourite, hymn, verse or bible reading and Esther Miller visited us to share her Elizabeth Letter with us. For February Mary Spalding kindly led a session on The Visited Planet, Valerie Broadbent a session on Mercy Ships and we listened to a Radio 4 Broadcast "A Bright Yellow Light" when Nadim Ednan-Laperhouse spoke to Emily Buchanan about his extraordinary religious experience when his daughter Natasha died from an allergic reaction. This brought us to this year's York Lent Course Study "Superstar". Keith made his quarterly visits to the group. In June he answered questions fired at him, in September he spoke on Things We Hold Dear, in December he led our third Advent session and in March he led our second Lent session. We thank Keith for sharing with us in these meetings.

This year we again decorated a Christmas tree for the Dickensian Christmas Tree Festival and based it on Christian Character.

We now look forward to another year's study with the welcome opportunity to study God's word and continue to grow together in our faith. We can assure anyone wishing to join us, at any time of a very warm welcome.

## Wednesday Fellowship

At **Wednesday Fellowship** we have been happy to welcome several new friends to join us and have between 25 and 30 people attending meetings. I would like to thank Gill, Alison, Nicky and Diana for leading the meetings so ably. Thanks also go to Margaret for producing the tea and set-up rotas and Margaret and Francis for their invaluable help with the technology. Of course our sincere thanks go to Gordon for setting up the hall for us and to Clive for clearing away afterwards.

We enjoyed a Christmas lunch at the Bear and the Ridgeway Handbell Ringers entertained us at our New Year party. Recent speakers have included Chris Caddy on The Lake District, Fay Pendell showed pictures of her Chelsea Garden, June Grunwald on her trip to Turkey, Michael Bailey on Buenos Aires and Peter Preston on British birds.

## Finance

#### **Finance Report**

The church's current financial situation is, with some significant reservation, satisfactory. Our accounting year runs from September 1<sup>st</sup> to August 31<sup>st</sup> and last November a full end-of-year financial report for 2018/2019, including formal accounts, was provided to Church Council and approved by our Independent Examiner. A further report was provided to Church Council in February. This brief report summarises some of the important points from the more comprehensive Church Council reports. More detailed information is provided in the accompanying tables.

In 2018/2019 the church's income and expenditure on normal, regular items necessary for the day-to-day running of the church were nearly equal at approximately £65,000. *The problem with this is that we had no significant surplus to put aside for future unusual large items of expenditure.* 

The total income of our General Church Fund was approximately £62,000 but only about £48,000 of this came from regular giving by church members plus the associated gift aid recovery. The balance was made up mainly from lettings income of approximately £12,000. *The church has become reliant on lettings income to pay its way and, even so, we are not generating a surplus for future needs.* 

Our reserves should equal approximately a half of our normal expenditure plus additional funds that we can justify against specific, planned, future expenditure on large items. At September 1<sup>st</sup> 2019 the church reserves were approximately £42,000. Of that about £31,000 is the essential basic reserve (recommended by the Connexion) calculated as half of our normal annual expenditure. That leaves only about £11,000 for unusual, future large items of expenditure.

The Church Council meeting in June 2019 agreed that the church should initiate a scheme to refurbish the church hall at a budgetary cost of £25,000. At the beginning of this accounting year we had only the £11,000 reserve and we therefore need to find another £14,000.

During the year our fundraising for charities continued to increase and we donated over £15,000 to charities compared with about £6,400 three years ago. While this is very commendable, the church does need to consider whether we are we applying too much effort and resources to generating income for charities while neglecting the church's needs.

It has been usual at the November Church Council meeting in past years to distribute "excess" money held in the Benevolent Fund to local charities. During the calendar year 2019 the Benevolent Fund made more donations to individuals in need than has been necessary in the past. This may be a reflection of the austerity imposed on Society by the financial crash of 2008 and the changes in the State's Benefits System (to Universal Credit) or a greater awareness by church members of the needs of disadvantaged local people. As a result the Benevolent Fund held less "excess" money in November than usual and Church Council agreed to delay making donations to local charities. However, by the February Church Council meeting the Benevolent Fund had recovered to a level at which Church Council agreed to make donations of £100 each to ten local charities. The meeting also agreed that the gift aid reclaimed from the donations received by Community Café could be allocated to the Benevolent Fund.

In the coming year we can expect church expenses to increase significantly and by more than inflation (RPI or CPI). The Circuit Assessment is our largest single expense. In 2018/19 it was £34,545, this year (2019/20) it is £36,600, and it is very probable that it will be increased by about 7.5% to £39,355 from September. It is also likely that our utility bills will increase by at least 7%.

During this year (and in future years) the church needs to generate a surplus of dayto-day income over day-to-day expenditure in order to provide money for future expensive items of refurbishment, partly through increased regular giving by members and partly by fund raising. In recognition of this the February Church Council meeting agreed that all the profits from "Wantage 175" events will be allocated to the proposed Hall Refurbishment.

It is worth reminding church members that if we are able to reclaim gift aid on their donations the amount is increased by 25%. Gift aid can be reclaimed if you pay in income tax more than would be reclaimed from the total of your donations to charities. If you think that is the case, please consider discussing this with the church treasurer.

I am now in my seventh year as church treasurer and would like to hand over this duty to someone else. Wantage is not alone in this as Wallingford Methodist Church, All Saints Methodist Church and the Circuit are also seeking new treasurers. If we are unable to obtain new treasurers, we will have to consider outsourcing the jobs. This is not impossible but will be expensive. The tasks of the treasurer can be split between two or three people and can be done using our existing software package or a commercial system. If you are at all interested and want to know more please speak to Keith or me, without commitment.

For those who like figures and want to know more about our income and expenditure, the detailed tables from the 2018/19 end of year report are provided below.

I am sure the church will wish to join me in thanking the many people who help the treasurer through counting the vestry money and in other ways.

## Property

#### Rob Charles

**Peter Preston** has stepped away from the chair of Property and Finance some 27 years after he joined the committee. His dedication and application to the work has been highly valued and he has made a significant contribution to the continuing good state of the buildings. We thank him for his service, knowing he will continue to assist when he can.

#### Methodist Insurance

We were required by the insurers to take a few actions. The work to satisfy the these requirements is complete.

Some advisory recommendations have been addressed regarding Lone Working and Finger Guards (to address the risks associated with trapping between the hinge side of the door and the door frame).

#### Hall Refurbishment

The hall building is now 27 years old and some refurbishment is needed to improve the energy efficiency of the building and renew aging services.

Renew the ceiling tiles in the Hall and corridors and meeting rooms.

Replace the lighting in the hall, corridors and meeting rooms with LED panels to give better maximum light levels, more flexibility and lower energy and maintenance requirements.

Replace the radiators in the Hall with modern equivalents to give better control and quieter operation, replace the boiler and control system.

Replace the hall chairs.

A budget of £25,000 has been approved and support from the Circuit is promised. We shall need to do some fundraising to cover the costs of this work.

#### Kitchen

We continue to try to maintain and improve our disciplines in the kitchen. An external inspection during the year criticised some aspects of our behaviour. The need for strict discipline is being emphasised with the issue of Coronavirus, but is essential at all times. Hand washing and keeping surfaces clean are key things we can do. Please do not take bags into the kitchen.

A new dishwasher has been installed after the old machine was unable to be repaired.

#### Hall Chairs

Two samples have been on site. They have been looked at after a Sunday service and at the meeting of Church Council. There are benefits and snags to both of them and we are evaluating peoples' responses.

#### Signage

"No Public Right of Way" signs have been obtained and are being erected in the Yard and the Church Street Passage. To protect our ability to shut the passage when needed and prevent the yard becoming an official right of way, we also need to close the gates at the Church Street arch for 24 hours once each year. We have done this in the past on a Boxing Day. This was not possible this winter and it will be arranged in the near future.

"EXIT" signs have been put in the Ladies' and Gents' washroom doors as part of our "Dementia Friendly" premises policy.

A "Gender Neutral" sign has been fitted to the "disabled" toilet door.

#### Routine work

The Health and Safety Assessment has been completed.

The kitchen boiler servicing included the replacement of some parts and it is now in good health.

One of the invisible jobs is the maintenance of the water softener for the dishwasher and we must thank Rodney Tillotson for his commitment to this task.

Portable appliance testing of electrical appliances is being carried out by PK Electric.

The fire alarm servicing is up to date.

The Hall floor has been treated.

#### Other Work

We are grateful to Doug Hatto for many jobs he has done this year including :

repairs to the brick wall adjacent to Spackman Court.

repairs to hall building window fixings and other hall woodwork.

A storage rack has been installed in the Hall store to try to make it easier to keep the place tidy. Two more helped support Little People and Food Bank in the Godfrey room during November and December.

Having had two of the **curtain tracks** in the Hall jammed and damaged, we have felt it wise to renew all the tracks. This has the added advantage that the draw cords will conform to modern safety standards.

We are grateful for all the support we get from members and friends in the upkeep of the property. Without their help the place would be a very different asset.

Sadly Rev Jocelyn Bennett has been unwell during the past couple of months and is currently on sick leave. This has meant an increased workload for the rest of the staff and for Keith in particular. The Circuit is very grateful for all that they do. The Circuit would also like to thank everyone, especially those at Didcot, Milton and Wallingford, who are helping to keep everything running smoothly during Jocelyn's absence.

We are very pleased that Deacon Selina Nisbett, who is in her fifth year in the Circuit, has been invited to stay for a further three years. She does invaluable work in the church and community of Abingdon.

We now hold Keith and Ian in our prayers as they go into the re-invitation/stationing process in May.

As ever, we are indebted to the dedicated team of Local Preachers, who lead services in the Circuit every Sunday. Once again they helped to provide the Advent devotional booklet.

The Circuit now has a new Safeguarding Officer, Debbie Adams and a new Circuit Meeting Secretary, Liz Wood. We are pleased that they have felt called to fulfil these roles. We continue to look for a new Circuit Treasurer and also more Circuit Stewards. Please speak to Keith or myself if you are interested and wish to know more about these positions. It is great to be part of the Circuit Leadership Team.

Our thanks to Mary Hancock, who amongst her duties as Circuit Property Steward, ensures that our Circuit staff have safe and suitable manses in which to live and work.

It is always good to attend Circuit services and events as it gives the opportunity to meet other Methodists in the area. There have been several Circuit services in the past year including the Easter Offering Service held at Didcot and a service at Trinity in July when we celebrated with Ruth Dams as she received her long service award for 60 years as a local preacher.

Everyone in the Circuit was invited to hear Clive Marsh, the Vice President of the Conference speak at the special Circuit meeting held at Didcot on 24<sup>th</sup> February.

The Circuit initiative on mental health began on 15<sup>th</sup> March at Wantage with 'Breaking the Taboo'. Rev Stephen Normanton of Peer Talk came to provide some input and to facilitate discussion and this was followed by an act of worship.

In the coming months we have a Circuit celebration at Milton on 26<sup>th</sup> April at 3 pm, when Val Grist will be receiving her long service award, and the 2020 Easter Offering service at Grove on 17<sup>th</sup> May at 3 pm. Looking further ahead we have the celebration on White Horse Hill on 21<sup>st</sup> June at 3 pm, when our Circuit will be celebrating 200 years of Methodism in the Vale with the Witney and Faringdon Circuit.

This year the Circuit was able to help 13 young people go to 3Generate in Southport. It is very inspirational to go to this Methodist youth event. Thanks to all those who went with them. Next year they only have to get to the NEC – a bigger venue is needed - Hallelujah!

The Chaplaincy project on Great Western Park continues to flourish and grow. We are very grateful to the hard work of the lead Chaplains, Sarah and Libby. They are now beginning to explore ways to work on the new Wantage and Grove housing estates. The Project is looking to recruit a third Lead Chaplain. A volunteer chaplain has joined the team and goes into one of the retirement homes on GWP on a regular basis.

Finally thank you to Keith for all the hard work he does in leading, encouraging and inspiring our Circuit. As he takes his Sabbatical later in the year, we pray that it will be a time of refreshment, rest and inspiration for him.

## Wantage and Grove Church Partnership

During the past year there have been further clergy changes within some of the churches in the Partnership. Rev John Green has become Pastor of Wantage Christian Fellowship, who had been without a leader since the departure of Glyn Oliver in 2016. As well as being an ordained Minister, John is also a Chaplain and a Bereavement Counsellor. He will continue to offer those services to the local community as part of his ministry in Wantage. Last September Canon Peter Turbitt, a longstanding member of the Partnership, going back to its establishment as Wantage Christian Council, retired. A greeting to wish him a happy retirement was sent from our church, and a greeting also went to his successor, Fr David O'Sullivan. He has become the new priest-in-charge at St John Vianney, and we look forward to working with him and have welcomed him to the Partnership. More recently two new members have been welcomed to the Action Group: Revd Chris Ashton is the Curate at St John's Church in Grove, and Andy Bruce is Assistant Pastor at Wantage Community Church.

The Anglican churches in Grove and Wantage set up a Church Welcoming Group with an objective of visiting all of the newly built and occupied houses. The visits are undertaken in pairs. All of the volunteers are trained beforehand and supported in their visiting work. Information leaflets from non-Anglican churches can be included in the welcome packs, but conditionally upon those churches providing volunteers to join the team of visitors. Mike and Judith Skinner have volunteered on behalf of our church.

The 'Open the Book' and 'Prayer Spaces' projects operating in local Primary and Secondary Schools are keen to sustain these initiatives, and they would welcome volunteers from any of the Partnership's member churches.

The AGM took place on 26<sup>th</sup> September in our church, and was well attended. A local representative from CAPUK, [Christians against Poverty], was the guest speaker. She spoke about her involvement with the organisation in relation to her personal experience of debt problems, as well as describing the work she does voluntarily as a CAPUK debt counsellor in the Wantage and Abingdon area.

For the first time in many years no Christmas greetings card from the churches in Wantage and Grove was received last year. An error with the printing was insuperable, and replacement cards could not be guaranteed to arrive in time for Partnership volunteers to sort and prepare them by the deadline set by the Scouts. This was a double blow, as not only did no greeting or details of Christmas services in all of the churches reach any residents, but the Scouts only received half of the usual income earned from delivering the cards.

On 19<sup>th</sup> January the annual Service celebrating the beginning of the Octave of Prayer for Christian Unity took place at St John's. The service was preceded by afternoon tea, creating a pleasant opportunity for socialising between people from all of the participating churches. The uplifting service which followed included a talk by Libby, one of the Methodist Community Chaplains currently working on Great Western Park in Didcot, and soon to be working as a Chaplain in this part of the Circuit.

#### Food Bank Distribution 2019

The reasons for individuals and families needing to seek help by way of having food parcels delivered are very varied. Family breakdown with the wage earner leaving home, low pay, redundancy, illness and problems with benefits (especially Universal Credit) are the main ones. It is humbling and also saddening to see how grateful people are in receiving the essentials for life.

If you know anyone who is struggling to make ends meet, please ask them to go to the Independent Advice Centre or talk to their health providers so that they can receive some help with food. Food for cats and dogs is also usually available. Whilst talking of help with food, please also tell folk about the Community fridge at the Mix. All the fresh food picked up from there (6 days a week, either morning or afternoon) is free. There is always bread and then other items of vegetables, dairy products etc as and when donated by supermarkets and individuals.

The Foodbank is run entirely on a voluntary basis and addition volunteers are always welcomed. There are a number of different roles with the organisation.

#### Wantage and Grove Street Pastors

This year has once again been a busy but fruitful year for Wantage and Grove Street Pastors. The celebration for 10 years of Street Pastors in Wantage was very special. Another wonderful piece of news is that our Town Mayor, having been out with the Street Pastors, has nominated the Wantage and Grove Street Pastors for The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service.

At the time of writing there are 16 active Street Pastors and 13 active Prayer Support Volunteers. Within our church family we have one Street Pastor in training, and we are delighted about that. We have a number of Prayer Support Volunteers including those who are at the centre when patrols are out and some people who pray at home. Prayer is vital to the work and is much appreciated by those out on the streets. At the time of writing, there are 148 people from different churches who support Wantage and Grove Street Pastors in one way or another. There are those who regularly donate money, those who support fund-raising events and those who generally take an interest in the work of the Street Pastors. All support is much appreciated.

In last year's report, Rodney anticipated a daytime patrol as requested by King Alfred's Academy. As yet that has not been possible. However, it is looking hopeful for a patrol to be happening before too long. There is a minimum number for a team and that might now have been reached so it is possible that training may commence soon. Please pray for this to be the case.

The financial position of the charity is quite healthy at the moment thanks to some generous donations and grants. Once again there have been some fund-raising events during the year. Notably, the performance in April by Mark Topping of "An Impossible God" was much appreciated, as was the "Curry and Quiz Night" in the autumn. The proceeds from our Christmas Tree Festival were donated to the Street Pastors, and that was much appreciated. Carol singing added to the donations.

Rodney Tillotson was involved with the Street Pastors from the very start. He had a number of roles over the years and his contribution in one way or another has been outstanding. He stepped down from active involvement, but his expertise is still being called on occasionally when some background information is needed to clarify the situation concerning some issue. Huge thanks are due and are given. Zack Smith has not only started training as a Street Pastor, but he has also taken on the role of Church Representative for our church from Rodney. That means that he is one of the people to ask about the work of the Street Pastors, the other one being me (I am currently still a trustee). Please ask one of us for the latest quarterly newsletter, and please pick up a prayer card designed to help you know what is being asked for by way of prayer. Also, if you wish to become a member in order to actively support the Street Pastors and receive regular monthly reports about the work being undertaken, do speak to Zack or me.
