My Soul Waits for the Lord!

Waiting in line for tickets, waiting for test or exam results, waiting for the birth of a first grandchild, waiting for the death of a loved one...

Last week, keen stargazers waited for the appearance of the first supermoon of the year – the hunter's moon, also referred to as the harvest moon. Ecumenical groups across the world waited for ten whole months before the 106th Archbishop of Canterbury was announced and the whole world waits for just and civil relationships between people and among communities and nations.

Waiting is woven into salvation history. God's people, Israel, waited forty years before they could enter the Promised Land. Centuries later, they waited nearly seventy years to be freed from exile; and after that, they waited another five hundred years for the Messiah to come! On a more individual level, Hannah and Elkanah (parents of Samuel) and Elizabeth and Zechariah (parents of John the Baptist) waited years for answers to prayer. All that waiting is summed up beautifully in the Psalmist's prayer, "Surely, I wait for the Lord; who bends down to me and hears my cry" (Ps 40:2).

The four weeks before Christmas, the season of Advent, is a time of preparation and expectation for the coming celebration of our Lord's nativity, and for the final coming of Christ "in power and glory." "Christ has died, Christ is risen, Christ will come again." During this season, the lectionary readings point us to the birth of Christ and also challenge the modern reluctance to confront the theme of divine judgement. As Christians, we are encouraged to actively recommit ourselves to bringing the Kingdom of God into our lives and that of our communities.

Advent is a time of waiting on the Lord and for the Lord, but in Advent we wait in a special way. To quote Henri Nouwen, "Waiting is not a passive thing. It is an active waiting in which we live the present moment to the full, in order to find there the signs of the One we are waiting for." (The Path of Waiting). So, in scripture, we are invited to stay awake and be ready. Jesus tells us that we are to be on guard, "alert at all times, praying that [we] may have the strength to escape all these things that will take place, and to stand before the Son of Man." (Luke 21:36)

So, we wait. We wait at bus stops, in supermarket queues, in waiting rooms and in schools. During the forthcoming season of Advent,

- let us wait expectantly for the birth of Jesus who is also the one on whom we have been waiting to bring peace and justice on earth.
- let us make space to wait slow down from the busyness of life and technology, to prepare our hearts and minds for what is to come: "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob; that he may teach us his ways and that we may walk in his paths." (Isaiah 2:3)
- let us wait with unwavering hope with the assured certainty that the Kingdom of God will come to execute justice and righteousness.

Wait for the Lord, whose day is near.
Wait for the Lord, Keep watch, take heart. (Taizé)

This month's choice is one that often recalls the brutality of warfare in the minds of those who view it. They're Lee-Elliot's *Crucified tree form – the agony* is an exceptional work of art. Lee-Elliott was the son of an Anglican priest but, according to his sister, he was an agnostic and may well have been an atheist. Yet after recovering from a very serious illness, possibly acute food poisoning, in the Netherlands in 1959 at the age of 56, Lee-Elliott embarked on a series of religious works. These especially included a number of sketches and paintings on the crucifixion, most of them with the cross and body of Christ as an interwoven tree trunk. These are far starker versions of the medieval works that depict the crucified Christ on a living tree that signalled death is not victorious but that resurrection comes next. The agony of Christ is portrayed graphically by Lee-Elliott, especially so in the work owned by the Methodist Church.



Crucified tree form - the agony depicts a broken Jesus, emaciated-like in appearance, tortured and disfigured. His head hanging down on an extended neck appears to indicate the length of time Jesus has been suffering, deforming his natural anatomy. Even in a small reproduced image the viewer might shudder at the pain it conveys; however, standing before the canvas itself is to feel the anguish of the painter himself.

What many see in the painting is a shattered tree trunk of No Man's Land from the First World War. Lee-Elliott adds to this perception by including strands of barbed wire on the trunk/cross/crucified Christ. The halo around the head of Christ found in traditional works seems to have been replaced by a ring of smoke and

evokes a battle scene.

As we commemorate once more the Armistice and remember the sacrifice of so many in defending these island nations from tyrannical regimes, the Lee-Elliott is a worthy consideration for the Christ who suffers with the suffering, dies with the dying, in order that all may live. This sense of solidarity is expressly captured by Jurgen Moltmann, twentieth century German theologian who grew up under the Nazi regime, in his book *The Crucified God*:

"When God becomes man in Jesus of Nazareth, he not only enters into the finitude of man, but in his death on the cross also enters into the situation of man's godforsakenness. In Jesus he does not die the natural death of a finite being, but the violent death of the criminal on the cross, the death of complete abandonment by God. The suffering in the passion of Jesus is abandonment, rejection by God, his Father. He humbles himself and takes upon himself the eternal death of the godless and the godforsaken, so that all the godless and the godforsaken can experience communion with him."



During the Covid lockdown I was searching the internet and came across four of the preparatory sketches for Lee-Elliott's work on a single sheet. They express the raw emotion of Lee-Elliott in the early days after he recovered from the illness that almost took his life. The preparatory sketches are now safely in my possession after the art dealer who had acquired them was somewhat kind to me, knowing how important the *Crucified Tree Form* is to Methodists. It is hoped that they will be exhibited alongside the finished work should Wallingford Methodist Church hosts some of the Methodist Church Collection in May 2027. It will be the first time they have come together in the same place for over 60 years.



Our next and perhaps final session for a while will again be at Wantage Methodist Church.


Saturday 22 November arrivals from 9:30 am, session start at 10:00 am, finish by 1:00 pm.

Pastoral Ann Barber

Autumn's falling leaves and rapidly reducing hours of daylight, lead us to appreciate the infrequent bursts of warm sunshine at this time of year. Shakespeare describes that scene at the beginning of one of his sonnets;

> "when yellow leaves, or none, or few, do hang Upon those boughs which shake against the cold, But ruin'd choirs where late the sweet birds sang"

Until the inevitable frosts arrive, the glorious richness seen in autumn leaves and berries still provide outdoor scenes of colour that only nature can offer us. We give thanks to God for such beauty in his creation. Even more precious is the certainty of his love and protection of everyone within his creation. For that we are thankful. It gives us much needed reassurance in facing the ever-increasing anxieties over worldwide issues such as military conflicts, natural disasters, climate change and social prejudices. At a more personal level, we also have to acknowledge the ways in which ageing brings challenges to our daily lives. As our Pastoral Links go on seeking to fulfil the calling to support everyone pastorally in the best ways possible, we are mindful that some within our Pastoral Team took on their role as Pastoral Visitors over half a century ago. Commitment to fulfilling the task has not waned, but the impact of diminishing physical energy and mobility, eroded by the passing years, cannot be halted. Hopefully, there is an acceptance within our whole church family that, with God's help, pastoral care will be offered and received with understanding, and with all of us graciously accepting that God's care for each one of us is constant and will never fail.

Halving the number of Presbyters in the Circuit has inevitably led to a big increase in the workload for our two fulltime leaders. Both Bruce and Georgina are working valiantly to fulfil their calling to care for the congregations belonging to all of the seven churches over which they share pastoral responsibility. For a while now, much has been written and discussed about ways in which it may be possible to involve more people in many aspects of church life. If this could be achieved, it would have the double benefit of lightening the load a little for Bruce and Georgina, as well as deepening our Christian commitment to serving others. When we are able to match appropriately what we learn during our sessions of worship with our efforts to offer practical service and support to others, we are putting our faith into action exactly as the Gospels urge us to do. In encouraging the congregations in his other churches to respond to this challenge, Bruce described the idea in the following way:

"We are an open and receptive faith community, eager to ensure everyone feels welcome and included. We are keen to develop and grow in all aspects of our ministry and mission. We have many things we would like to do more effectively and the more volunteers we have, the more we can achieve through the power and presence of the Spirit."

On the 2nd November our annual Service of Remembrance will take place at 4 pm and will be led by Revd Georgina, our Circuit Superintendent. During this short service

the lives of those who have died will be remembered. As well as prayers and some hymns, there will also be an opportunity to light candles and give thanks for those who are loved but seen no longer. Afterwards, there will be refreshments in the hall, offering a time for fellowship together. Everyone is welcome.

Several of our church family continue to struggle with health problems, including some for whom worshipping in person is no longer possible. We assure them that they are in our thoughts, and we will continue to pray for them, asking for God's love to surround, protect and bless them.

Finally, we have some happy news for which to give thanks to God. Emma and Mark Sarpong, who regularly come to Kids @ Church with their son Ezra, have recently had their second son, Eli Kweku Sarpong. He was born at the JR on 17th September, weighing 7lbs 9oz. The message adds; "Ezra is being a wonderful big brother! "We offer our congratulations and our love to all of the family.
